If this war, if this enemy, if that king should have been contemned, neither the Senate nor the Roman people would have thought this war had to be undertaken with such care, nor would Lucius Lucullus have carried it on for so many years and with such glory, nor would the Roman people have entrusted to Cnaeus Pompeius the care of putting an end to it.

We then say in defence of Lucius Murena that, as a lieutenant in this war, he was recognized to be a man of the greatest courage, of supreme judgment, and of the greatest perseverance; and that all this conduct of his counted no less towards his acceptance of the consulship than this forensic activity of ours.

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
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
